Despite the fact that hummingbirds are small, they are among the fastest

The hummingbird is the only bird that doesn't migrate in flocks and isn't found in a flock, and it can take up to a year to reach its final destination. The name hummingbird comes from the humming sound the birds' wings make when beating fast.
