Why do some countries adopt secular institutions while others do not? In *The Origins of Secular Institutions*, Zeynep Bulutgil develops a theory that combines ideational and organizational mechanisms to explain how institutional secularization occurs. She first focuses on why political groups with a secularizing agenda emerge. Secularizing political groups are at a comparative disadvantage when it comes to recruiting grassroots support because, unlike religious actors, they cannot rely on a pre-existing institutional structure. They become likely to overcome this obstacle if they have time to build a robust organization before religious political movements emerge. Bulutgil supports these arguments by

combining statistical analysis of original historical data with comparative analysis of countries in Europe (France, Spain, The United Kingdom) and the Middle East/North Africa (Turkey, Morocco, and Tunisia). An authoritative explanation of why political secularization occurred in some countries but not others, this book will reshape our understanding of an issue of unsurpassed importance for over two centuries: the effects of modernity on politics.

**Faith and Feminism in Pakistan** Afiya S. Zia 2017-11-30 Are secular aims, politics, and sensibilities impossible, undesirable and impracticable for Muslims and Islamic states? Afiya Zia contends that Muslim

womens piety is no threat against the dominant political patriarchy, but their secular autonomy promises transformative changes for the population at large, and thereby effectively challenges Muslim male dominance. This book is essential reading for those interested in understanding the limits of Muslim womens piety and the potential in their pursuit for secular autonomy and liberal freedoms.

We focus too on corporate Christianity with its growing entrepreneurial interests in private health; private schools; aged care; and in tax-free benefits of \$31 billion per year - in a period of "budget austerity". "Personal and private faith" is not the issue here - people will believe what they wish - but chapter 7 does review what neuro-science says about religion. Chapter 8 analyses the provenance of Christianity and the New Testament with meticulous research by Dr Richard Carrier -

irrefutable proof of 'pious fraud' and fabrication that the public and media will find enlightening. The book comes together at chapter 9 with evidence of Sweden's secular success and why it is a realistic model for Australia's future. *Sacred to Secular* is based on authoritative and credible research - referencing academics, historians, theologians and respected journalistic sources.

**Multi-Secularism** Paul Kurtz 2017-07-12 The contemporary world is witness to an intense controversy about secularism. This controversy has intensified due to the presence of fundamentalism, which challenges secular society and the secularization of philosophical ideas and ethical values. Secularists maintain that the state should not impose a religious creed upon citizens and should respect freedom of conscience, the right to believe or disbelieve in the prevailing orthodoxy. This right is guaranteed by the First Amendment to the US Constitution and the Rights of Man enunciated in the French Revolution. Yet many powerful religious institutions do not accept this principle. Paul Kurtz argues that secularism needs to be allied to the emergence of democratic institutions that respect individual freedom and the pluralistic society. Many people believe that it is impossible to maintain a moral order without the support of religion. Kurtz was involved in the campaign for secularism throughout his career as a philosopher. This book reflects his participation in this battle and extends his thinking to new areas.

*Secularization and Religious Innovation in the North Atlantic World*

David Hempton 2017-05-12 In the early twenty-first century it had become a cliché that there was a 'God Gap' between a more religious United States and a more secular Europe. The apparent religious differences between the United States and western Europe continue to be a focus of intense and sometimes bitter debate between three of the main schools in the sociology of religion. According to the influential 'Secularization Thesis', secularization has been an integral part of the

processes of modernisation in the Western world since around 1800. For proponents of this thesis, the United States appears as an anomaly and they accordingly give considerable attention to explaining why it is different. For other sociologists, however, the apparently high level of religiosity in the USA provides a major argument in their attempts to refute the Thesis. *Secularization and Religious Innovation in the Atlantic World* provides a systematic comparison between the religious histories of the United States and western European countries from the eighteenth to the late twentieth century, noting parallels as well as divergences, examining their causes and especially highlighting change over time. This is achieved by a series of themes which seem especially relevant to this agenda, and in each case the theme is considered by two scholars. The volume examines whether American Christians have been more innovative, and if so how far this explains the apparent 'God Gap'. It goes beyond the simple American/European binary to ask what is 'American' or 'European' in the Christianity of the nineteenth and twentieth centuries, and in what ways national or regional differences outweigh these commonalities.

Mehmet Salih Sayilgan 2017 Muslims in modern Turkey went through a dramatic and painful experience of secularism. It was not an organic process. The secular establishment emerged at the expense of religious freedom as well as access to spiritual resources. As part of the secular

agenda, institutions providing religious education and spiritual formation were completely shut down. The new Republic embarked on a journey of forming individuals based on scientific materialism and Turkish nationalism. Within this new context, Muslim communities sought resources to form faithful believers. One of these communities was the Nur community founded by Said Nursi (d. 1960). This dissertation researches the dershanes (place of study) gatherings of the Nur Community. It argues that the Nur Community has been able to offer a non-violent and non-political approach in cultivating Islamic spirituality and Muslim communal life in modern Turkey. In actualizing this goal, the spiritual gatherings in the dershanes in which Nursi's magnum opus, the *Risale-i Nur*, is read and discussed have played a key role. This endeavor has become the community's non-violent jihad. The research is based on a qualitative method. It relies on Nursi's own work and secondary sources concerning the Nur community as well as the context in which it emerged. The study is divided into three chapters. The first chapter is an introduction to the historical context in which Nursi lived. In addition, it provides an overview of the emergence of modern Turkey and the rise of secularism. The second chapter focuses on the dershane gatherings of the Nur community and forms of Islamic spiritual gatherings particularly during times of persecution. The third chapter assesses the readings of the *Risale-i Nur* in the dershanes as a practice of religious reading in a modern secular environment. It also compares the readings in the dershanes with some of the religious readings in the Christian tradition. The findings are summarized in the conclusion.

The cultural debris that these saboteurs have created will take decades to clean up. In feisty prose Donohue explores our nation where a college student is threatened with expulsion because she prayed on campus, a civil rights organization protests a statue of Jesus found on the

ocean floor and a housewife sues a school district to stop the singing of Rudolph The Red-nosed Reindeer at a school choral production. These are just a few examples cited that demonstrate a culture descending into madness. Donohue takes no prisoners as he digs out and exposes the groups behind this all-out attack on our Christian traditions. Among these are the radical atheists, the proponents of multiculturalism, the sexual libertines, the Hollywood elite with their not-so-hidden agenda and lawyers who collaborate for profit.

**Political Islam and the Secular State in Turkey** Evangelia Axiarlis 2014-06-20 How safe is Turkey's liberal democracy? The rise to power in 2002 of the right-leaning Islamic Justice and Development Party ignited fears in the West that Turkey could no longer be relied upon to provide a buffer against the growth of Islamic fundamentalism in the Middle East.
